Wendy Atkin is pursuing a PhD in History at Carleton University, researching a thesis on child care practices in Canada. She has held contract positions with the National Archives and has been an Acting Public Affairs Coordinator with the National Association of Women and the Law.

After obtaining an MScin protein chemistry from the University of British Columbia and an MAC in conservation science from Queen's University, **Helen D. Burgess** was hired in 1978 by the Conservation Processes Research Division of the Canadian Conservation Institute. Her current title is Senior Conservation Scientist, and she is responsible for the coordination of research being done in the area of paper conservation.
